**Re:** I Need a Fix—The Democratic Nomination by the Numbers

Did you know that Barack Obama has won more votes in the fifteen races he has lost than in the twenty-nine he has won? Or that more than half of those who voted in this year's Democratic primaries and caucuses are self-identified moderates and conservatives? Or that in a race that is so remarkably close, only 5 of the 44 contests have been decided by 4 points or less?

Neither did we—until we crunched the numbers.

We were interested less in who's up and who's down in the delegate count and more in how actual voters are responding to these two candidates. So if you want to know who will be swimming through balloons in Denver, then look elsewhere (to the 16 trillion pundits out there). But if, like us, you're curious about the actual results and what they might mean—read on.

Before we get to the good stuff—a few disclaimers.

**Disclaimer #1:** To each of the campaigns who feel that this analysis is slanted toward your opponent—you're both right.

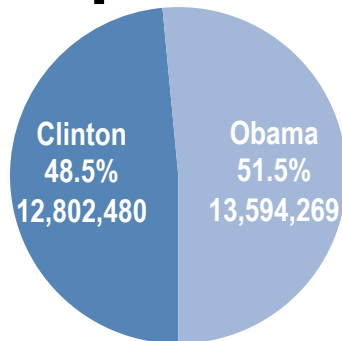
**Disclaimer #2:** To nit-pickers who say we miscalculated the Hispanic vote in Grand Forks—get a life.

**Disclaimer #3:** To those in search of our methodology—relax, it's at the end of this document (because it's far too long, complicated and dull to explain up front).

## The Democratic Nomination by the Numbers

Through 44 races in states, protectorates, and someplace called Americans Abroad, Barack Obama holds a 13,594,269 to 12,802,480 lead over Hillary Clinton. That is a margin of 791,789 votes, or 51.5% to 48.5%. By way of context, Barack's popular vote lead is greater than Hillary's margins in California and New York combined. Beyond the overall total, however, the breakdown of votes based on publicly available exit polls shows some fascinating things.

### Popular Vote

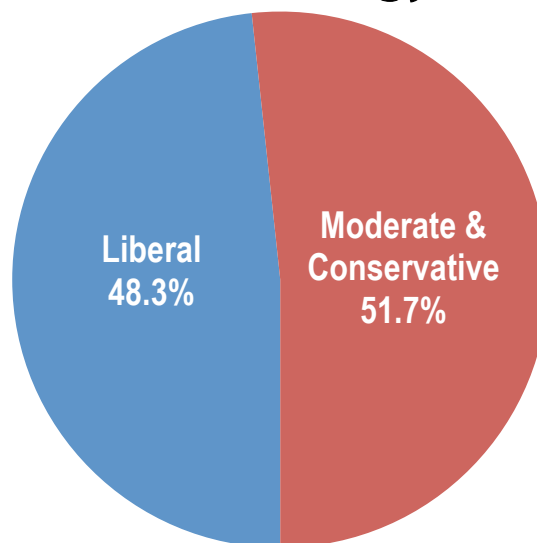


### Ideology:

So much for the liberal base. More than half—51.7%—of the voting electorate in Democratic primaries and caucuses self-identified as moderates and conservatives. Both Obama and Clinton have received more votes from self-identified moderates and conservatives than self-identified liberals.

- Among the 17.9% of the electorate who self-identified as *very liberal*, Obama bested Clinton 53.8-46.2%.
- Among the 30.3% of the electorate who self-identified as *somewhat liberal*, Obama bested Clinton 50.7-49.3%.

### Voter Ideology



- Among the 40.9% of the electorate who self-identified as *moderate*, Clinton bested Obama 50.3-49.7%.
- Among the 9.4% of the electorate who self-identified as *somewhat conservative*, Obama bested Clinton 52.1-47.9%.
- Among the 1.4% of the electorate who self-identified as *very conservative*, Clinton bested Obama 50.9-49.1%.
- When we combined the liberals into one group and the moderates and conservatives in the other, we found that Obama beat Clinton among both ideological camps—51.9-48.1% among the liberals and a 50.1-49.9% squeaker among the moderates and conservatives.
- Clinton won 5,727,150 votes from self-identified liberals and 6,364,164 from self-identified moderates and conservatives. Obama won 6,173,510 votes from self-identified liberals and 6,400,063 from self-identified moderates and conservatives.

We assigned a numerical value to ideology—1 for very liberal, 2 for somewhat liberal, 3 for moderate, 4 for somewhat conservative, and 5 for very conservative—to determine the mean ideology for Clinton and Obama voters. We found that Clinton voters were ever-so-slightly more conservative than Obama voters.

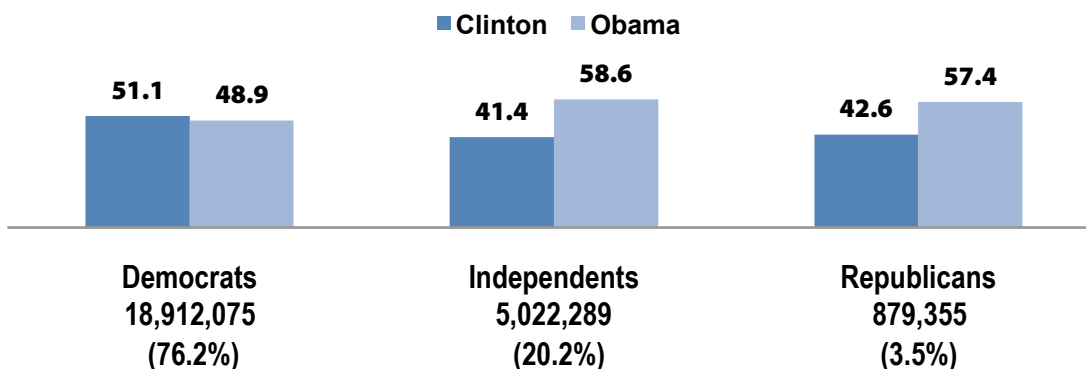
- The mean Clinton voter scored 2.48 on the ideology scale—about the midpoint between somewhat liberal and moderate.
- The mean Obama voter scored 2.44 on the ideology scale—about the midpoint between somewhat liberal and moderate.

### **Party Affiliation:**

Obama's entire margin is based on Independents and Republicans who voted in primaries and caucuses. Clinton holds a narrow, but steady lead among registered Democrats.

- Clinton holds a 421,000 vote lead and a 51.1-48.9% margin over Obama among registered Democrats.
- Obama holds an 860,000 vote lead and a 58.6-41.4% margin over Clinton among registered Independents.
- Obama holds a 130,000 vote lead and a 57.4-42.6% edge among the small number of Republicans who voted in the contests.

### The Popular Vote by Race:

You may have heard that race is a factor in this contest. There is, of course, a race gap, but the split between African-Americans and Latinos is far more pronounced than between African-Americans and Whites. Obama wins nearly every state in which the African-American vote is large. But Clinton wins nearly every state in which the African-American vote is intermediate. And Obama wins most states in which the African-American vote is tiny.

#### Whites:

Hillary Clinton: 9,010,450—55.7%

Barack Obama: 7,175,566—44.3%

#### African-Americans:

Hillary Clinton: 788,785—15.3%

Barack Obama: 4,383,620—84.7%

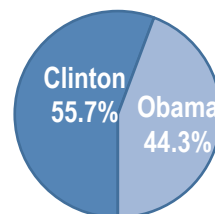
#### Latinos:

Hillary Clinton: 2,347,138—63.2%

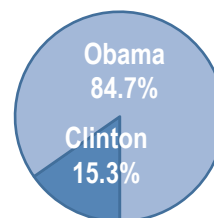
Barack Obama: 1,365,694—36.8%

- Clinton holds a 26-point margin among Whites in the South (which includes Virginia where Whites went for Obama). In non-Southern states, Clinton holds a 54.4% to 45.2% lead over Obama among Whites.

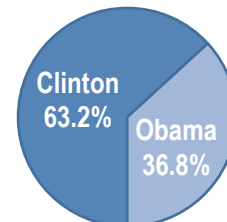
#### Popular Vote by Race: White Votes

#### Popular Vote by Race: Latino Votes

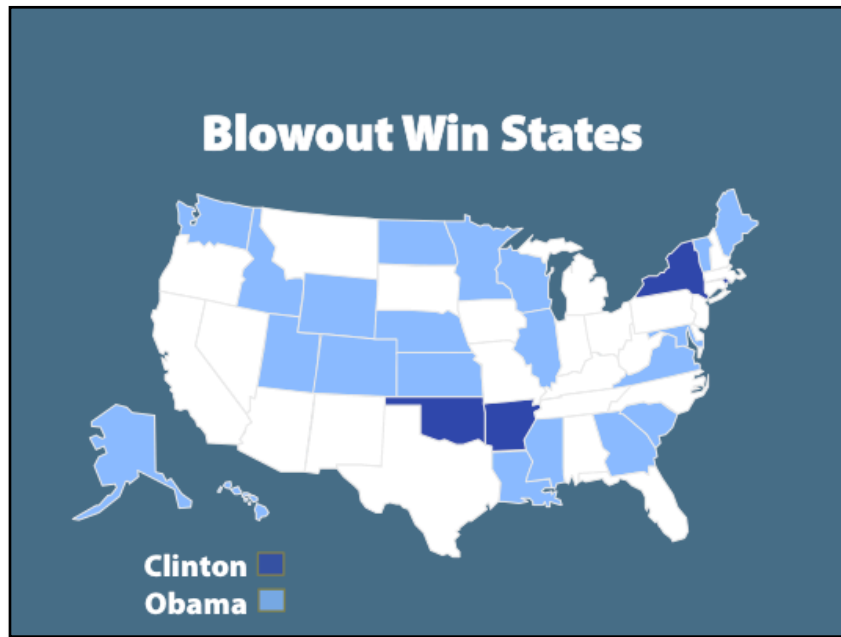


- Other than her home state of New York and Massachusetts, Clinton has not surpassed 25% among African-Americans in any state.
- Obama generally wins Latinos in states with small Latino populations (Utah, North Dakota, Missouri, Kansas, Idaho, Georgia, Washington, Nebraska, Maine, DC, Wisconsin, and Wyoming) and loses them everywhere else (with the exception of Colorado).
- Obama has won the White vote in 10 caucus states (Iowa, North Dakota, Minnesota, Kansas, Colorado, Alaska, Washington, Nebraska, Maine, and Wyoming) and 7 primaries (Utah, New Mexico, Illinois, Virginia, DC, Wisconsin, and Vermont).
- Obama has won 10 of 12 races in which the African-American vote surpassed 20% of the total (he lost New Jersey and Tennessee).
- Clinton has won 5 of 6 races in which the African-American vote was between 10-20% (victories in Nevada, New York, Arkansas, Ohio, and Texas with a loss in Missouri).
- Obama has won 18 of 26 races in which the African-American vote was less than 10%.

### **Margin of Victory:**

Even though this is an extremely close election, most of the individual state races can be categorized as blowouts. Twenty-four of 29 Obama wins have been won by 16-points or more. And only 5 of 44 races have been decided by 4 points or less. The typical margin of victory in an Obama state is 25.2%; in a Clinton state it's 11.0%.

  - » Obama—24 Blowout Wins: South Carolina, Utah, North Dakota, Minnesota, Kansas, Illinois, Idaho, Georgia, Colorado, Alaska, Washington, Virgin Islands, Nebraska, Louisiana, Maine, Virginia, Maryland, Democrats Abroad, the District, Wisconsin, Hawaii, Vermont, Wyoming, Mississippi
  - » Clinton—4 Blowout Wins: Oklahoma, New York, Arkansas, Rhode Island



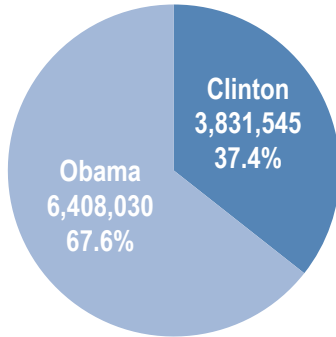
- 7 Solid Wins (10-15 points):
  - » Obama—2 Solid Wins: Delaware, Alabama
  - » Clinton—5 Solid Wins: Tennessee, Massachusetts, New Jersey, American Samoa, Ohio
- 4 Modest Wins (5-9 points):
  - » Obama—1 Modest Win: Iowa
  - » Clinton—3 Modest Wins: Nevada, California, Arizona
- 5 Squeakers (4-points or less):
  - » Obama—2 Squeakers: Missouri, Connecticut
  - » Clinton—3 Squeakers: New Hampshire, New Mexico, Texas
- Each of the last 14 races won by Obama has been by margins of 17-points or more. By contrast, Clinton has won just 4 states by 17-points or more and two of them are her home states of New York and Arkansas.

### Big States and Small States:

Although 24 of 29 Obama wins have been blowouts, the average margin of victory for an Obama win is smaller than a Clinton win. That is because Clinton has won more of the larger states and Obama has won more of the smaller states and caucus states.

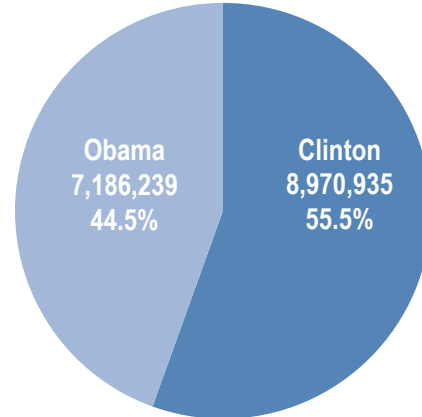
- In his 29 victories, Obama has won by an average tally of 220,967 to 132,122 in the raw vote—a margin of 62.6% to 37.4%, or 88,845 votes per win.
- In her 15 victories, Clinton has won by an average of 598,062 to 479,083 in the raw vote—a margin of 55.5% to 44.5%, or 118,979 votes per win.
- Obama has actually received more votes in the 15 races that he lost (7,186,239) than in the 29 that he won (6,408,030).

### Methodology:

Everything we used is from publicly available documents, so you could have done this at home.

### Raw Vote Totals:

Most of the raw vote totals came from the CNN, MSNBC, or Real Clear Politics websites on final election results. For caucus states, we went to the websites of the state Democratic parties and local newspapers to find the total raw vote—often based on county-by-county tallies. We also used an analysis called “United States Election Project” at [elections.gmu.edu/voter\\_turnout\\_2008\\_primaries.htm](http://elections.gmu.edu/voter_turnout_2008_primaries.htm). For Washington State, we used estimates based on exit polls, newspaper reports, and the state party website. For some reason, they don’t seem to count the votes over there.

Also, as you may have noticed—we only counted Obama and Clinton votes. This is a comparison of how the candidates are faring against each other (our apologies to Mike Gavel).

### Ideology and Party Affiliation:

Our results for ideology and party affiliation do not include tallies from North Dakota, Minnesota, Kansas, Idaho, Colorado, Alaska, Washington, Nebraska, Maine, the District of Columbia, Hawaii, Wyoming, American Samoa, Virgin Islands, and Americans Abroad. While this seems like a lot of missing states, be aware that they represent only 6.0% of the raw vote total.

### Votes by Race:

In most states, we relied on Edison Media Research and Mitofsky International exit poll data from msnbc.com and cnn.com to determine the racial breakdown of the vote. In several states where that was not possible—often based upon a small sample size of a particular group—we worked backwards by using the raw vote total and subtracting out the white vote (which we generally knew through exit polls) and calculating from there. In situations where we had no exit poll data on race, we assigned Barack an 85-15% victory among African-Americans (his mean victory total among that group) and calculated from there. While this is admittedly inexact, keep in mind that in most states with no exit polling, the electorate is overwhelmingly white. Also, the vote among African-Americans is remarkably constant. No exit polling was conducted in Colorado, Oklahoma, North Dakota, Minnesota, Kansas, Idaho, Washington, Nebraska, Maine, and Wyoming, so we based our estimates of the electorate on census data and 2006 exit poll data. For the District of Columbia, we relied on an analysis posted by crossingwallstreet.com, which was based on precinct-by-precinct results. Finally, we did not assign any votes based on race for Alaska, Hawaii, Virgin Islands, Democrats Abroad, and American Samoa.

**The Spreadsheet:**

Attached is our spreadsheet. The cells in yellow represent numbers that we estimated based on the methodology we described above.

Why are some figures in yellow? Anything in yellow means we made some estimation - either by census data, backing out other vote totals, or state party turnout estimates.
